'GOOD NEWS' FROM AROUND THE CIRCUIT

CHINNOR

Dear All,

This Sunday, 30 June, the focus of our Circuit Prayers is on Chinnor.

Rod reminds us that the influence of our ministry on those around us is difficult to quantify and we may



never know the results of our work. But, as Rod says, our actions will make a difference. Please pray this week for both those who are seeking and those who are pointing, that their efforts may bear fruit. Pete.

Chinnor is often referred to as a friendly village. Further, during feedback after a time of reflection within last week's service, our Church was referred to as providing a warm welcome. It is good news to hear our church is experienced as a place for caring and sharing.

Over the years, Chinnor has had a couple of strap lines to relay its mission and ethos.

Some years ago we came up with 'Caring and Sharing through Jesus', and, more recently, 'The hidden Church with a big heart'. Both endeavour to highlight purpose and mindset, to help those less familiar with the church to understand what we are about.

In other ways Chinnor is no different to anywhere else in the UK. There is Good News (for many) across Britain as a result of the airwaves being full of the European (football) Cup and a pending General Election, allowing the opportunity to make a difference. There is less emphasis on Christianity and the influence of Christians. However, is it not the case that many football clubs came into existence through churches, some protestant and others Catholic, through their work with youth? Also, many senior clergy hold positions within Parliament and, through principles held, influence policies for our society. That seems to be quite a significant contribution.

Chinnor Methodist Church celebrated its 150th Anniversary last July.

What influence has it had through its youth groups (one of some 50 years standing)? What influence has the application of Christian principles, association with Christian Aid and Fairtrade, had on lives, the local environment, and how individuals approach and act towards others?



Steps to Forgiveness

1) Accept people as they are and don't try to change

- 2) See your offender as God's tool for your growth. It's easier to forgive someone when you stop seeing them as Satan's agent sent to destroy you, and begin seeing them as God's instrument to develop you. The life of Joseph speaks to this principle. The path that led him from the pit to the palace was paved by injustice, disappointment, betrayal. But God used each painful circumstance to get him to his destiny. And God can do that for you.
- 3) *Try reconciling with your offender*. Reconciliation is God's nature. 'When we were enemies, we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son' (Romans 5:10 KJV). And what God did for you, He wants you to do for whoever you are at odds with. Jesus made reconciliation a top priority by saying, 'Leave your gift there before the altar...First be reconciled...then come and offer your gift' (Matthew 5:24 NKJV). Yes, it will take selflessness and humility on your part, but the return is worth the investment!
