'Write for Rights' Letter Writing Campaign 2024

Over the few past weeks I have introduced you to Amnesty's Write for Rights 2024 campaign, and I am including this information again in case you missed it.

The campaign features people from around the world, all of whom are connected because their human rights have been violated. Some by their governments, others by the police, or even by big corporations.

Real letters and cards can bring hope to people in the direst of situations; people who've been harassed, threatened and jailed for who they are and what they do.

When letters arrive in huge numbers, they are also an unmistakable reminder to prison authorities and others that the world is watching.

For every case, there are two types of messages you can write – one to the person we are fighting for, or their family, so they know we will never forget them, and one to the person in authority.

1. Write a message of solidarity. This is where Write for Rights began: writing a card/letter to people who are wrongly punished, to show them that they're not alone and not forgotten by the rest of the world.

2. Write an appeal letter

In a world of petitions, physical post does get noticed! As well as writing to the people experiencing human rights abuses, you can write to the authorities who can bring them justice.

If writing letters isn't for you, you can also take action online – see above.

DOES IT WORK?

Yes! Every year, real change happens because of your letters and actions. People wrongfully imprisoned are released. Abusers are brought to justice. And people in prison are treated more humanely. A few words go a long way, for all of us. They can make us feel seen, supported, safe.

MARYIA KALESNIKAVA, Belarus

A professional musician, Maryia Kalesnikava has filled her life with music, art and people. She's passionate about meeting people and learning from them, and dreams of a Belarus where everyone is respected and allowed to speak freely. This led Maryia to become involved in the August 2020 presidential elections. She joined the campaign of independent candidate Svyatlana Tsikhanouskaya alongside Veranika Tsapkala. The three women united after the leading male candidates had been jailed or fled. In a country where rights to freedom of expression, association and peaceful assembly are severely restricted, this formidable trio called for change and offered hope to many.

It is widely believed the opposition won, but the election was rigged, and Alyaksandr Lukashenka returned for his sixth term. Following the election, Svyatlana and Veranika were forced into exile and Maryia emerged as the highest profile opposition figure. She stood at the front line of peaceful protests, confronting abusive police officers, and making a heart-shaped symbol with her hands in front of riot police.

On 7 September 2020, Maryia was abducted by the Belarus authorities. Dragged into a van by masked men, she was taken to the border, intimidated and pressured to leave the country. She escaped through the van's window and tore up her passport to resist deportation. Maryia was arrested, detained and later sentenced to 11 years in prison on charges including "undermining national security" and "extremism".

Maryia is imprisoned in appalling conditions, with limited access to the healthcare she needs and isolated from other inmates inside the prison. Maryia's family and friends have not heard from her for over a year.

JOEL PAREDES, Argentina

Twenty-nine-year-old ceramicist Joel Paredes lives in Humahuaca, a small town in Jujuy, a northern Argentine province. In June 2023 the local government pushed through changes to the province's constitution, including restrictions on the right to peaceful assembly, as well as measures that may cause damage to the environment, and risk violating Indigenous Peoples' land rights. The changes were approved without consultation with Indigenous Peoples or the wider population.

Jujuy is a province rich in lithium, a metal known as 'white gold' due to its worldwide demand for the creation of batteries. Argentine authorities want to expand lithium exports. But people who live on the land, like Joel and his family, have serious doubts.

Although not Indigenous himself, Joel sympathized greatly and was concerned for the future of his children who would grow up on the land. In support, on the evening of 30 June 2023, Joel joined a protest in Humahuaca square. Alongside hundreds of peaceful demonstrators, Joel played a 'bombo' drum with his band while the City Council discussed the changes in a nearby building. For Joel: "Our musical instruments are our weapons."

In the early hours of 1 July, the police arrived at the square and started recklessly firing rubber bullets into the crowd. Joel was hit in his right eye. The injury required surgery, but doctors could not save his sight and Joel is now permanently blind in his right eye. Joel is also left with debilitating nerve pain that impacts his daily life. No one has been held accountable for what happened to Joel and the other protesters.

NETH NAHARA, Angola

For Ana da Silva Miguel, a 32-year-old singer and mother with two young children, life in Angola was frustrating and hard. How could a country with so much potential, allow so many of its people to live in poverty?

Fed up with the lack of schools, employment and opportunity, Ana took to TikTok, becoming 'Neth Nahara' – social media influencer and commentator. Neth shared stories of her life with her followers, good times and bad. She was bubbly, fun and unafraid to speak her truth. Neth encouraged women to seek out education and gain independence. She also bravely shared that she had HIV and gave advice on how to stay healthy.

On 12 August 2023 Neth went live on her TikTok channel, openly criticizing President João Lourenço. The very next day Neth was arrested at her home in Luanda, Angola's capital. She was summarily tried, convicted and sentenced to six months in prison. On 27 September 2023 the sentence was increased to two years.

The Angolan authorities are using a controversial law (criminal code 333) to silence critical voices like Neth. The law was passed during the Covid-19 pandemic – a time when the Angolan people took to the streets to express their discontent with the president's leadership – and makes "insulting" the president a crime.

For the first eight months Neth spent in arbitrary detention she was denied the daily medication needed to treat HIV. Only after repeated requests from her lawyers, was she finally given the necessary medications.

Neth Nahara and others like her are being detained and mistreated because they dare to speak out.

This Sunday, 24 November, we hear the story of a member who has spent many years as a Local Preacher, starting in 1959 when she was 23.

Elizabeth tells us that she grew up in a Norfolk village and says:



"I went to the Methodist Church every week with my parents. When I was 12, the Minister asked me directly about my faith. I said 'Yes', and from then on was a Christian. I went on to Teacher Training College where I was a member of Meth Soc and witnessed for Christ.

My first teaching post at Great Yarmouth High School was teaching Cookery, Needlework and Scripture. In those days, this was Christian-based. I felt led to train and qualify as a Local Preacher. I then went to Australia, teaching there for a year on an 'Exchange'.

I taught for 5 more years before starting work with the Bible Society, covering the counties of Kent, Surrey and Sussex, where I drove around to various churches in the area, encouraging members to read their Bibles regularly.

I met and married David and we had two boys, Simon and Ian, who now live abroad. David and I came to Oxfordshire where I was a Lay Preacher at Wallingford Methodist Church, and where I led services including Funerals and Holy Communion, and undertook pastoral support work.

We retired to Bicester, later moving to Chinnor to be near one of our sons and his family who then lived here. I continued as a Local Preacher and ran a Bible Study group.

My Christian Faith and continuing witness is as important to me in the Care Home where I am living now as it was when I was young. I attend church and church events as often as possible and use the Methodist Prayer Handbook and Bible Reading notes regularly. I welcome new residents in, encourage residents to join with the Bible studies and Communion services here, and visit those who are unable to leave their rooms.

God has a purpose for us all in all stages of our lives."
