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Dear All,

A change of direction this week!

As with any subject, a knowledge of the background and context can add massively to our understanding of what an author might be saying, and the Bible is a good example of that in practice. Often some passages may seem a little odd or difficult to understand, so to help us all in our understanding, alongside our Good News features from the churches, we will be introducing some extra items along the lines of the article below.

We start with an introduction to the Gospel of St Matthew.

Please do read the article from Richard below, and if you have any thoughts or constructive criticism, do feed them back to me and we will discuss your thoughts.

The Gospel of Matthew

Author: Probably not Matthew the tax collector and disciple named in the Gospels. More likely to be somebody with a Jewish religious background who was familiar with the structure of the laws of the Old Testament.

Date: Nothing certain but scholars assume it was written after Mark for the reasons below. There are opinions about when Mark is thought to have been written, but probably in the 60s AD

Style: One of the three synoptic gospels. In simple terms, this means that Mark, almost in its entirety, is copied by both Matthew and Luke. Then there are the stories that are unique to Matthew and Luke.

Features: Matthew is the most Jewish of the Gospels - he talks about the Kingdom of Heaven rather than the Kingdom of God, reflecting the Jewish unwillingness to use God's name.

His Jewishness is also thought to be reflected in the way in which he arranges his material. In the flow of his narrative, there are five distinct teaching blocks which may relate to the five books of the Law in the Old Testament. The first of these, the Sermon on the Mount, is the most important exploration of Christian morality.

The genealogy in Matthew 1 traces the line of Jesus back to Abraham, while Luke, the most Gentile of the Gospels, takes the line back to Adam.

You might like to look at the 5 teaching blocks to try and sense how the theme runs through. They are:

Matt 1: 5-7. The Sermon on the Mount – the discipleship discourse

- Matt 1: 10. The missionary discourse
- Matt 1: 13. The parabolic discourse
- Matt 1: 18. The discourse on the church
- Matt 1: 23-25. The Olivet discourse

Passages worth looking at:

Matthew 5:1-12. The Beatitudes – how do these words resonate with us?

You could compare the three versions of the Parable of the Sower to see how similar they are (Matt 13: 1-89, Mark 4: 1-9, Luke 8: 4-8).

Then have a look at the following passages that are only in Matthew, and ask what they tell us about Matthew's belief:

Matthew 25. The three parables are all unique to Matthew.

Matthew 28:16-20. Some would say this is the most impactful ending of all the Gospels.

Think right, and you will live right

'The mind of the wise instructs his mouth.' Proverbs 16:23 AMPC

The Bible says, 'The mind of the wise instructs his

mouth, and adds learning and persuasiveness to his lips. Pleasant words are as a honeycomb, sweet to the mind and healing to the body' (vv. 23-24 AMPC).

Your thoughts and your words are intimately connected. Because of this, it's important that you think pleasant thoughts so that you can speak pleasant words.

Your thoughts are silent words that not only you and the Lord hear, but when verbalised, affect your emotional, spiritual, and physical well-being.

Solomon says, 'Pleasant words are...healing.' Your thoughts are silent words that affect your inner man, your health, your joy, and your attitude.

The things we think about often come out of our mouths and sometimes make us look foolish. But if we live God's way, our thoughts and words can make our lives and the lives of others more enjoyable. The New International Version of the Bible says, 'The hearts of the wise make their mouths prudent, and their lips promote instruction' (v. 23).

Don't make the mistake of thinking that you can let your thought life run in any worldly direction it wants and then fake it by speaking godly words. Either both are pleasing, or both are negative and sinful. There is no middle ground.

Paul writes, 'Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus' (Philippians 2:5 NKJV). Scripture is your doorway into a new realm of living. As you spend time letting Jesus adjust your thinking, you won't have to think about speaking pleasant words, wise words, instructive words, or healing words. It will just happen naturally.




CHURCH READINGS: December 2024 to February 2025.
